1. COURSE OUTLINE

- Title of the course: Spanish Language and Culture.

– Description of the Course:

In this course students work on the different skills (comprehension, expression and oral and written interaction) and the different competences (grammatical, lexical, phonetic, cultural and strategic) focusing on communication and action processes. The contents involved in the teaching-learning process of Spanish are distributed in different levels and sub-levels and are developed from activities and tasks that facilitate students' reflection and practice on language and culture. We will be offering the following language levels: B2.1 and B2.2, following the

guidelines of the CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference for Languages) and the PCIC (Curricular Plan of the Instituto Cervantes). These courses will be equivalent to the University of Toronto third year language courses, i.e., SPA 301 and SPA 302.

Courses have a language and a culture component. Between 9:15-12:45, students receive language instruction and from 13-14 students will be register on a seminar of their choice among those offered during their summer session (see additional document with seminar descriptions). Twice a week in the afternoon, students will participate in cultural activities.

- Course Prerequisites: Taking a level test on the first day of the course.

- Course Objectives:

- 1. Participate in oral and written interactions using a varied and complex structures, expressing themselves with fluidity and spontaneity both in the personal and social sphere.
- 2. Integrate aspects related to the linguistic and cultural variety of the Hispanic world into communication processes.

- Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Understand what the development of communication competence entails and the elements that make it up.



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- 2. Reflect on the importance of the interrelationship between linguistic, pragmatic, cultural and strategic elements for the success of communicative interactions.
- 3. Take responsibility for the importance of self-employment and control of one's own learning in the process of language acquisition

2. COURSE OUTLINE

- **Title of the course:** Communicative practice.

- Course Objectives:

- 1. Review, clarify and deepen the contents (linguistic and cultural) seen in language classes.
- 2. Participate in recreational and interactive activities that help strengthen communication skills.

– Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Understand the role of interaction in the development of communicative competence.
- 2. Reflect on the benefits that play, theatrics and gamification can have on confidence in the mother tongue.

– TEACHING METHODS:

The methodology used in all classes is based on an action-oriented communicative approach, with students and their needs at the centre of learning. Comprehension, expression and interaction skills are worked on through individual and group activities and tasks.

Students receive two grades, one for participation and one for exams. The final grade consists of 50% class participation and student progress; and another 50% for oral and written exams.

Class Attendance:

1. Absences
