Course Description

Based on readings, lectures, experiential activities and discussions, this course will examine the cultural and environmental history of Puerto Rico. The course will explore debates on colonialism, capitalist modernity, economic development, environmental sustainability, ecosystems, religion, race, and politics. This analysis will help with the consideration of Puerto Rico as the last colony of the Americas within the larger context of the Caribbean. Term work will be based on response papers, two partial exams and participation in class debates.

Prerequisites: Completion of 4.0 full-course equivalents by 2024 Winter term. **Breadth Requirements** = Creative and Cultural Representations (category 1) + Society and Its Institutions (category 3)

Evaluation:

- 3 critical reflection papers 30%
- 2 partial exams 50%
